## **ESA PRESS STATEMENT**

# ***Report reveals stark contrasts in waste and recycling industry health & safety performance***

**LONDON, 21 November 2016:** The Environmental Services Association (ESA), the voice for the UK's resource and waste management industry, today highlighted the variation in health and safety performance that persists within the industry.

Health and safety statistics published this month by HSE shows that injuries in the waste management industry have increased on the year before. A (provisional) 2015/16 RIDDOR injury rate of 1,854 represents a 6.3% increase on 2014/15. However, what is perhaps masked by HSE's headline data is the wide variation in performance that exists within the industry, with ESA Members achieving a 32% injury reduction.

This shows that ESA's RIDDOR injury rate of 628 is nearly three times lower than that of the wider waste industry and that the 67.5% reduction in injuries achieved by ESA Members since 2009 has not been mirrored by the waste industry as a whole (a 17.5% reduction).

ESA's Policy Advisor, Stephen Freeland said:

***“While there is certainly no room for one-upmanship when it comes to health and safety it is nonetheless important to help shed light on the variation in performance that exists within our industry.***

***We hope that our report and data update will allow for resources to be better targeted on those areas which can bring about most meaningful improvement in the industry's overall performance. Going forward, ESA will continue to work to ensure that "lessons learnt" and best practice is disseminated for the benefit of all".***

### **Notes to editors:**

4. **The sector at a glance**
  - Total turnover: **£11 billion**
  - Direct Employment: **106,000 people** (*including waste collection, treatment and materials recovery*)
  - Municipal waste handled each year: **27 million tonnes**
  - Energy generated (across landfill gas, anaerobic digestion and energy from waste) each year: **approximately 11,867 GWh**, which is 3.5% of the UK's electricity
    - **9,083 GWh of that was renewable electricity** (taking out non-biodegradable portion of EfW) which is **11%** of UK's renewable electricity
  - Greenhouse **gas emissions down by 70% since 1990**.
  - The **top seven companies account for approximately 40% of turnover**. Many hundreds of SMEs provide either localised or more specialised services
